## COURT OF REVISION

(continued from page 1)

The value of the land on which the Capitol Theatre stands was let stand at \$23,210 but the building value will be given further consideration. It was valued by the assessor at \$85,000 which was \$15,000 higher than the last year's assessment.

An assessment of \$70,680 on C. N. R. trackage was referred to the city solicitor for an opinion. It is claimed by the company that the legal rate should have been \$59,622.40.

The rock lots on which the Prince Rupert Club stands were reduced from \$4,000 to \$3,200 but the value of the building remains at \$7,000.

A change of \$200 was made in the value of improvements on a property owned by J. and T. Dybhavn in Section 6.

The assessment of \$150 on a small building owned by Olaf Ness was struck off.

In the case of a small piece of waterfront leasehold reported by the railway company to have been leased to N. M. McLean and which Mr. McLean denied had been transferred to him, it was decided that Mr. McLean would have to pay. The amount of assessment was \$875.

Improvements on a building owned by A. Brooksbank valued at \$800 was reduced to \$400 and another owned by Mrs. Brooksbank was reduced from \$1,800 to \$1,100. Both of these were in Section 5.

The value of the building known as the Western Rooms was reduced from \$3,500 to \$2,500 and a building owned by James Hegarty in Section 1 on Second Avenue was reduced from \$1,500 to \$1,000. Another building owned by S. J. Jabour in Section 1 was reduced from \$2,500 to \$2,000.

A number of changes, mostly on land were asked but not allowed, the applicants being J. C. Mulville, Mrs. C. Deierlein, W. H. Harness, W. Gould, Mrs. L. Morrison, Mrs. L. Brooksbank, Imperial Oil Co. and Home Oil Distributors. A building owned by W. D. Roberts was reduced from \$400 to \$300 but the land allowed to stand at \$400.

M. M. Stephens and George Casey appeared on behalf of the Prince Rupert Ratepayers Association and asked for a general reduction of 15% which will be dealt with before the court completes its work. A session is being held this afternoon.
