First Picture of World's Grain Exhibition and Conference Building at Regina



This reproduction of an architect's drawing represents the magnificent building now being specially erected on the fair grounds at Regina for the purpose of housing the educational, competitive and commercial exhibits of the World's Grain Exhibition and Conference to be held in that city from July 25th to August 6th, 1932. It will cost approximately \$200,000 and as soon as completed will be placed in charge of the National Committee of the World's Grain Show, who, under the direction of J. O. Turcotte, Dominion Exhibition Commissioner, will immediately commence and carry out the work of interior decoration appropriate for the big event of that year. The building is beautifully situated south of the automobile building. The main portion is 640 feet long and 120 feet wide. Each of the wings are also 120 feet wide and extend 300 feet from either side of the main unit, all providing a floor space of approximately 150,000 square feet. It is a substantially built permanent structure with stucco finish, allowing for ceiling space of 18 and 22 feet. Mr. Turcotte is well known in many countries, where he has had charge of similar work for the Dominion Government, and Canadians and others may feel assured that the work when completed will be not only suitable and appropriate for the occasion, but well worthy of the objects to be attained by this great
