mons and for the Senate, but our provincial legislators do not think that women are fit to vote in our provincial elections. How can that be logical, and how can the opposition of the majority of our legislators be justified when the Council of the Bar Association itself saw no reason why the entry of women to the profession should be prohibited.

The Gazette said: "The Quebec legislature remains consistent in a thoroughly inconsistent attitude towards female suffrage. The one good thing that can be said of the rejection of the suffrage bill was that the vote was non-partisan. The brevity of the debate was out of all proportion to the importance of the issue and the lack of any ministerial contribution to the discussion is likely, quite unnecessarily, to accentuate the sense of grievance which promotes the measure must inevitably harbor. The one Liberal to speak against the bill was Amodee Caron, who hails from the Magdalen Islands, where, it is safe to assume, the women's suffrage movement is not particularly lively and where Mr. Caron runs little risk of retribution. The fact that the woman suffrage movement is not sufficiently widespread in Quebec to impress the members of the legislature may supply a reason, of sorts, for the repeated rejection of franchise bills, but it is not a good reason if the principle upon which the women are founding their claim is a sound one. It has been considered sound in other provinces and in other countries, many other countries, and its acceptance has had very solid grounds. Legislation, nowadays, is reaching steadily into new fields of domestic activity, and in many of these fields the feminine judgment is likely to be far more valuable, because of the practical experience behind it, than the judgment of the meer man can ever be."

ASSURING PROSPERITY

Business Craft Developed Through The Centuries Prove Inadequate, and Now Economists Are Seeking New Ways

Builders of the ships of commerce and industry are engaged today in one of the greatest tasks since their first frail craft were buffeted and battered by the winds of economic uncertainty. For centuries they have bent their efforts to fashion a vessel strong enough to ride the gales of depression and reversal. Now they are searching for ways to make the very storms abate.

Economics has taken on a new meaning. Once it merely explained what happened. In the wake of one of the world's most trying periods of business, it is being viewed as a means through which some greater measure of control can be exerted over those factors which sway the course of Labor and Capital.

These things have transcended academic bounds. The housewife has become interested because the price of eggs and bread is affected. The shoemaker is concerned because, strangely enough, some people seem to be without shoes simply because there are too many shoes in the country. The banker looks at his profits and the mechanic looks at his wages—each of them wishing that the ships business would sail a bit more smoothly so that every man could be sure of his income.

A way to stop the storm—this has become the key to the task to which economics has set itself. It is not sufficient to explain the "economic environment" of the day. If the environment is not suitable, perhaps it can be changed. There is a growing conviction that this is entirely possible and that depression can be not only shortened, but actually prevented.
