GITLAKDAMIX LIQUOR CASES

Several Native Offenders as Well as Aiyansh Postmaster Fined

AIYANSH, Jan. 20.—As a result of a sudden raid made on the Kitlaktamix Indian Reserve by Dominion Constable E. G. Newnam, assisted by Indian Constable C. Morven, about twenty gallons of home-made liquor was seized and destroyed and the following were arrested and dealt with accordingly:
George Williams and Catherine Williams for manufacturing liquor were fined \$30 and \$5 costs each.
James Woods for the same offence was also fined \$30 and \$5 costs.
Walter Woods was fined \$15 and \$5 costs for intoxication.
These fines were paid.
Constable Newnam afterwards arrested Harold Gray, postmaster at the Aiyansh white settlement, and took him to Prince Rupert where he pleaded guilty before Police Magistrate H. F. McLeod to a charge of supplying liquor to Indians and was fined \$100 and costs of the prosecution or three months in jail. He paid the fine.

OIL SPOT SIGHTED

Pilot Eckmann Also Believes He Has Seen Another Piece of Renahan's Fuselage

Pilot Ansel Eckmann, who is conducting an aerial search for further wreckage from the plane of Pilot Robin Renahan which disappeared on October 28, in a message last night from Ketchikan to provincial police headquarters here, stated that he saw yesterday off Point Davison what he believed to be an oil spot on the sea. A search party was to be sent out from Ketchikan today with a diver to investigate. Should the oil spot be still there, it was the intention to send the diver down to ascertain whether or not the lost plane might be there and the oil issuing from it.

Eckmann also stated that he sighted what he believed to be a section of the fuselage of Renahan's plane on Driest Point near New Metlakatla. A search party will also go there today.

Point Davison, where Eckmann believes he saw the oil spot, is 15 miles south of Ketchikan. It was on this point that one of Renahan's landing wheels was found.

Accompanying Pilot Eckmann on his search flight yesterday was Capt. Steve Selig, veteran halibut fisherman, who is well known in Prince Rupert.

Eckmann advised the police that he intended flying to Prince Rupert today with Mrs. Renahan so that she might catch the steamer Catala this afternoon and sail for her home in Vancouver. The weather this morning, however, was very stormy with strong wind and visibility nil so it was hardly expected Eckmann would attempt to fly in here. Mrs. Renahan has been at Ketchikan for almost a week. She has conceded that her husband must have perished.
