WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Will Soon Prepare For Season's Activities—Teeny Milly Off to Vancouver—Biological Boat Contract Abandoned

As was the case with Christmas, the arrival of the New Year was celebrated soberly and sanely by the folk of the local waterfront. With the ceremonies of ushering in 1931 now well and truly celebrated, the thoughts of the most of the marine people are now turning from the doldrums of the winter and close season to the serious matter of preparing for the activities of the coming year. Soon again there will be the usual bustle and stir which has been so noticeable by its absence during the past six weeks or so.

Mrs. Lindsay Is Honored

At the regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon of the Ladies' Aid of First Baptist Church at the home of Mrs. J. A. Lindsay, Park Avenue, the presentation was made to Mrs. Lindsay, retiring president of the Aid, of a beautiful sandwich tray in recognition of her work for the Aid. The presentation was made by Mrs. George Hibbard who made suitable remarks. Before the meeting closed delicious refreshments were served.

The provincial police cruiser P. M. L. 8 and the Indian Department's Naskaena have been getting in quite a few running hours just recently although we may not all be privileged to know what all the running around is about. Both boats are in good shape and ready for an active season.

Good progress is being made with the construction of Dr. L. W. Kergin's fine new power cruiser at the local dry dock and the craft will be ready in plenty of season for 1931 activities. It appears to be a trim little vessel and should be one of the show boats of the local yachting fleet. A Red Wing engine is being installed.

Tenderers on the new power vessel which it was planned to build for the use of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station have been returned their bids and it is evidently not the intention of the government to proceed with the construction of the vessel for the meantime at least. The local dry dock was one of the tenderers. Financial stringency is said to have been a factor in the decision not to proceed at this time. It is to be hoped that the boat will be provided soon, for it is needed.

Capt. George Cook left today for Vancouver with his halibut boat Teeny Milly. The trip south is being made so that certain adjustments may be done on the 48 h.p. semi-diesel Gardner engine in the vessel. The Teeny Milly was built during the last year and, in her initial season, fared fairly well. Capt. Cook expects to return to port in about two weeks' time.

With the end of December, the duck and goose hunting season came to a close this week. There was not much excitement attending the conclusion of the season since the most of the nimrods were still celebrating the festive season. There had not been much activity in hunting for a month or so.
