Three-Two Taxi Bowed to C. N. R. A. in Senior League Match Last Night

Japs Victorious

High School Trims Tuxis and Goes Into First Place

There was a large crowd of enthusiasts out to witness several upsets and some very fine league basketball last night. First of all, the lowly Japanese Association team of the Junior League hoisted itself a little further out of the cellar by vanquishing the Rovers. Then the High School came to life and made a good job of trimming the Tuxis who now share first place with them. This should make Friday's game between Merchants and High School a great battle, as the Merchants are but one game in the rear. The Comets took the Amazons very thoroughly and showed a much superior brand of team play and shooting. Finally, in the Senior division, 32 Taxi, who established a favorable lead in the first half, later bowed to the brilliant team play and "close-in" shooting of the C. N. R.

The Senior game was fast and clean, and, from the start, it developed into a contest of two types of play, long range shooting versus team play and close shooting from under the basket. And the latter system proved the better with C. N. R. finishing strong on the happy end of a 37-23 score. The whole C. N. R. team was good with Smith, Styles and Lambie outstanding because, being forwards, their scintillating combination and shooting caught the eye. However, Morrison and Bob Stalker presented a formidable defence that the Taximen preferred to shoot over, rather than to work through and around. Ratchford's shooting in the first half was phenomenal with Gurvich, Menzies and Doug Stalker toiling hard.

Party of Vancouver Men Had Splendid Trip Recently on Service Boat Nora Jane

Capt. Norman Brodhurst of the Pacific Salvage Co. staff returned to the city on the Prince Rupert this morning from Vancouver after having acted as pilot of the T. A. Kelley Logging Co.'s service boat Nora Jane on a hunting trip south of here with a party of prominent Vancouver business and professional men who were the guests for the trip of Thomas A. Kelley, well known Queen Charlotte Island logging operator.

The trip proved a delightful one for all on board the Nora Jane, reports Capt. Brodhurst. Out two weeks, Gardner Canal and Giltees were among the points visited. One mountain goat, one bear and numerous deer, geese and ducks were bagged by the southern hunters. Weather was really too fine for the best of hunting, there being but one day of rain and one day of snow during the entire outing. Departure on the trip was made from here on November 28 and the Nora Jane arrived at Vancouver on Monday of this week with her guests.

TELEGRAPH STILL DOWN

Fresh Breaks on Line Reported—Wireless Service to Vancouver

Telegraphic communication between Prince Rupert and the outside world was still interrupted this morning and it was believed that heavy snow with frost on the lower Skeena River last night had probably caused even more breaks in the lines. Strenuous efforts were being made to restore communication but heavy snow was hampering the work of the trouble finders.

More important business between here and Vancouver and other southern points is being handled by wireless. Telephonic service between here and Haysport and Port Simpson is being maintained by the Government Telegraphs.

HITLER IS CRITICAL

German Fascist Leader Predicts That Emergency Decree of Chancellor Will Fail

BERLIN, Dec. 16.—Adolph Hitler, German Fascist leader, made a spirited reply yesterday to the accusation of Chancellor Heinrich Brüning that he was really endeavoring to stir up civil war while preaching fascism.

Hitler predicted that Brüning's recent emergency decree would be a failure, "Laws not words, will help Germany," declared Hitler.

RADIONS TO STAY

Broadcasters Are Not to Be Banned From Pacific Coast Conference Football Games

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16.—At a meeting here yesterday the Pacific Coast Football Conference decided not to ban radio broadcasters from conference games. Certain new regulations were made, however, to prevent interference of newspapermen with play during the progress of a game.

TROUBLE ON POWER LINE

Electricity Now Coming to City From Shawatlans—Heavy Snow On Falls River Route

The transmission line between the city and Falls River having been put temporarily out of commission due to heavy snows, the Northern B. C. Power Co. has been bringing power into the city since yesterday from the emergency plant at Shawatlans Lake.

It was stated this morning that the Falls River transmission line was again in commission but, owing to heavy snow conditions, its use was hardly practicable. The telephone line between the city and Falls River is also down. Men are now cruising the line.




