A. for Vancouver, in speaking the other day before the civic bureau of the Vancouver Board of Trade, hypnotized by the sound of his own voice, he took a rap at everything in the way of provincial public works, the Cariboo highway, the bridge at Quesnel, the Alaska highway, in fact everything of an expenditure that is not near Vancouver.

He was careful not to mention that all B. C. is paying taxes and plenty of them for the P. G. E., for the University, for the Sumas Reclamation, and a dozen other things tributary to and for the benefit of Vancouver. He likes as well the taxes they pay to be spent in and about for the benefit of Vancouver, but when it comes to playing back, oh no, with hands to high heaven, loud is the noise against such an iniquity.

It is high time the north sent men south capable and with sufficient sand to combat such noisy jays, for as always their very noise, unless silenced, detracts from real issues and will go a long way toward stagnating northern development.

SUNSHINE WAS MORE

But Month of November Kept Up to
Rest of Year For Excessive
Rainfall

The month of November kept up the standard of more precipitation in line with other months of 1931 when compared with 1930. Precipitation for the month just ended totalled 9.47 inches as compared with 31 inches in the same month last year and brought the total precipitation for 1931 to date up to 90.11 inches as compared with 69.85 inches in the first 11 months of 1930. Sunshine for the month of November this year totalled 63.1 hours which was almost double that of November 1930 which amounted to but 34.4 hours. Sunshine for 1931 to date, however, continues to show a decrease when compared with the aggregate for 1930 to the corresponding date. So far this year there has been a total of 808.4 hours of sunshine as against 1283.74 hours in the first 11 months of 1930.

November this year was colder than for some years past, a minimum of 22 above zero being recorded as against a minimum of 28 in the same month last year.

Following is the meteorological summary for the month of November this year as announced this morning by R. G. Emmerson of Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist:

Highest barometer reading at sea level, 30.49 on November 21.
Lowest barometer reading at sea level, 29.25 on November 16.
Maximum temperature, 54 on November 16.
Minimum temperature, 22 on November 16.
Mean temperature, 37.8.
Total sunshine, 63.1 hours.
Total precipitation, 9.47 inches.
