MENTAL HEALING

Diseased Mind Not Now Regarded As Disgrace—London Experts On Brain Illness

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The need of mental healers for diseases of the mind was stressed at a recent conference here of the Central Association for Mental Welfare, and the difference between the present-day attitude of the people toward these afflicted with diseased minds and the former idea of disgrace attaching to such was pointed out. Dr. A. W. T. Forrester, Medical Superintendent at Warwick County Mental Hospital, declared: "There is far less disgrace in some mental diseases than in gout." Mental diseases hitherto had been looked upon as a disgrace, to be associated with high walls and locked doors and spoken about in a whisper, Dr. Forrester said.

Rt. hon. Arthur Greenwood, Minister of Health, said: "We are at the beginning of a new stage in dealing with this problem. The public are beginning to realize that mental disease is a disease with which the human mind and human care ought to be able to grapple." Dr. Coulson Williams said a large class of the community was suffering from sick minds for which medicine could do lamentably little. There must be developed in the medical profession people with a

knowledge of psychiatry and human nature, and endowed with vigorous and robust personalities, who would have to develop into mind healers, Dr. Williams said.

DUNCAN HAS FIRE TODAY

Thirty Thousand Dollar Building Owned By Knights of Pythias Destroyed

DUNCAN, V.I., Jan. 21.—Fire early this morning destroyed the two-storey frame building of the Knights of Pythias here, causing damage estimated at \$30,000. There were a number of stores on the ground floor.
