

Prince Rupert Teachers' Association Has Interesting Meeting

The monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association took place last evening in the Borden Street School. In the course of the business meeting, it was reported that two of the three books ordered for the educational shelf of the public library had arrived and that the third had been ordered from England.

The subject for the evening was "The Value of Literature." Miss Norah Rivett, who was convener for the evening, was also the first speaker, taking the subject from the point of view of the primary grades. To the beginner at school, literature was the opening out of a new horizon. Previously his interests had been purely personal. His association with other pupils gave him new interests and these were enlarged on his introduction to literature through stories. Nature study, handwork and stories would of themselves provide a fairly liberal education for a child. The training in language, the joy of expression, the play of the emotions and the underlying rules for conduct were all important contributions of literature. The inseparability of poetry and music and rhythm and their value were recognized in their power to enrich the life of the children.
