### CONTRIBUTORY OR NON-CONTRIBUTORY

A dispatch from Ottawa states that Premier Bennett has refused a request of the Workers United League of Canada to secure the passage of a law providing for noncontributory insurance. This is not insurance as generally corner to save the collapse and tie up. understood but is what is usually known as "The Dole." It is a payment handed out by the state to men out of employment, the money being contributed wholly by the taxpayers of the country. While this system is usually urged by the Communist party and other supporters of the Russian system, so far as we can ascertain, the system is not in vogue in most parts of Russia where every man is expected to give services for the money he receives.

This Workers' United League is the same body that applied to the Prince Rupert city council at its meeting last Monday night for support in its effort to secure legislation along the lines asked by Mr. Bennett.
