Washington Man and Woman Who Abused Girl to Serve Prison Terms

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24:-Mr. and Mrs. Harry Riley have been each sentenced to two years' imprisonment here on charges of cruelty to Riley's nine-year old daughter. In addition they were each fined \$250.

It was found that the child had been kept for two years in a dark cupboard by her father and stepmother and cruelly beaten and abused. The sentence was the maximum provided under the law. The judge stated he would have given a more severe sentence had the law permitted.


