Displace Detroit Tigers From Third Place in the American League-Reds Take Cellar In National

CLEVELAND, June 9-By defeating the Cleveland Indians here yesterday, the Philadelphia Athletics advanced to third place in the American League standing ahead of the Detroit Tigers who dropped a close game to the New York Yankees at Detroit. The Washington Senators lost by a margin of one run to the Chicago' White Sox at Chicago and the lead of the New York Yankees in the league standing was increased to six full games.

The three-way tie for cellar position in the National League was broken with the New York Giants going into sixth place by defeating the Cincinnati Reds who took undisputed cellar honors. The Phillies defeated the Pittsburg Pirates and captured seventh place. The Chicago Cubs increased their margin of league leadership to one game and a-half by defeating the Brooklyn Dodgers at Brooklyn while the Boston Braves were losing to the St. Louis Cardinals in a slugfest at Boston.
