> "Last year over five thousand teachers in our normal schools were qualifying for the rank of specialists in physical training. The duration of the course, covering anatomy, physiology, hygiene, psychology, education, practice teaching and kindred subjects, involves a period of only 45 hours' study," Dr. Lamb pointed out. "This travesty," he said, "will persist until the program for the training of teachers

Tracing the history of the public 40 attitude toward physical education during the past generation, Dr. 54 Lamb said that up to 1900 "systems" 47 and "methods" prevailed, in which ormal calisthenics, drills and exerises were the order of the day. Some of these were taught today in certain schools and they were termed "poisonous" by the speaker. From 1900 to 1910 games and sports with high-powered competition became the vogue. The coach was enthroned in all his glory. From 1910 to 1920, probably as a revolt from previous decades, he said, our publie play made "play for all" a motto. Then from 1920 to 1931 emphasis was placed upon the health education program.
