Headed by a flag-bearer and the Guards' band, a citizens' committee marched toward the Colonial Building to present to the legislaper investigation" of charges made by Hon. Peter Cashin against the prime minister. In response to a published notice thousands of citizens joined the parade until the crowd swelled to nearly ten thousand. Shops and business establishments were closed and all eyes were turned toward the legislature.

#### Battled For Flag

Again the flag-bearer and the band led off, followed by the committee and a section of the crowd of citizens. But there was another section keen for staying and continuing the battle, and they would not fight under anything less than the Union Jack. So they promptly seized the flag and bore it back toward the ward zone. The law-abaiding citizens wanted to march under the Union Jack, however, so they put up a struggle for repossession. The police joined in, and it was a three-cornered brawl. By the time the unruly ones reached the building and were using the staff to batter in the door, the flag was in shreds. Finally the police won that section of the battle, captured the torn flag and carried it to the safety of the assembly.
