PORT CLEMENTS IS STILL BUSY

Two Mills Continue Operations
Employing Over Seventy Men
—Hub of Islands.

PORT CLEMENTS, Dec. 26.—Activity at Port Clements, Graham Island, is still great although the winter season is on. Several storms have been experienced but the weather is considered quite normal this season and some excellent weather has prevailed.

A number of the spruce camps and mills have closed down for the winter but at Port Clements itself, two mills employing over 70 men are working full shifts. Between the two, the Lewis and Lynch mills, there is at present 7,000,000 feet of cut spruce in the yards and this is being continually added to.

The tug Lorne left on Monday last with a scow of 400,000 feet for Prince Rupert. The little G. T. P. steamer is making regular trips across the straits with scows but the barges cannot be obtained as often as they could be used. The result is that lumber is accumulating in the yards faster than it can be taken away.

Port Clements now boasts a population of about 350 people besides quite a number of transient folk who are always passing through. It is by far the most active point on the Queen Charlotte Islands at the present time. Besides the two mills right at Port Clements there are about 25 men employed at Woolridge's logging camp. These are the only three timber plants at present operating actively on the Islands.

HAZELTON

At the church bazaar held last Friday over two hundred dollars was received to be divided towards the support of the local churches. The ladies of both towns worked hard towards the success of the event and their efforts were most fittingly rewarded with the gratifying result.

The closing exercise at the New Hazelton School reflected great credit on the teacher, Miss Wallace. The closing was held on Friday afternoon last and there was a large attendance of parents and friends.

Leonard and Ralphine Wrinch have returned from Edmonton to spend the Christmas holidays with their parents, Dr. and Mrs. H. C. Wrinch. They are attending school in the prairie city.

Fred. Duboard has returned home from a fur buying trip to the Cariboo country. While in the south he visited Vancouver.

Harry Larment, Francois Lake, and James Eastmount, of Colley-mout, passed away at the Hazelton Hospital last week. They were aged 54 years and 57 years respectively.

The Cassiar Crown and the Ruby mines are developing well and a lot of good ore was uncovered this season. The former has made a particularly good showing, running copper ore to a value of \$35 per ton.

Word has been received here of the death at Guelph, Ont., of Miss Helen J. Bone, who, for several years, was superintendent of the local hospital.

VANDERHOOF

On Tuesday night last T. A. Barnard, defeated labor candidate at the recent Victoria bye-election addressed the public at a meeting held under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association. He discussed points of current interest and urged specially that war veterans should stand, determinedly, for adequate re-establishment. At the close of the meeting a resolution was passed criticizing the extravagance of the Federal government and advocating that Federal Government be compelled to test the feeling of the people on the re-establishment issue.

A new loading station is to be built in the local railway yards. The increasing business passing through this point has made this new structure necessary to avoid congestion.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$15 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than five years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per acre, and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and including a class of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided existing improvements, made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, in-herent and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under County officer. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.
