TRENTON, N.J., June 14:- Police ave been forced to admit that evidence linking the suicide of Violet Sharpe, maid in the household of Mrs. Dwight Morrow, with the abduction and killing of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. is fast dwindling. Despite the identification by the abduction it has now transpired that not Ernest Brinkert but a man named "Ernie Miller" had been with Miss Sharpe on the night in

Brinkert is still being held by the police despite the fact that his alibi has been corroborated and it now appears that he had nothing to do

A new bulletin, issued yesterday dicated that the investigation of the kidnapping of the baby had again reached a dead end after collapse of the police theory that 'guilty knowledge" had caused the suicide of Violet Sharpe.
