SCHMELING CONFIDENT

Schmeling had a public workout yesterday and all those who saw the champion agreed that he was in fine shape for the fifteen-round bout.

Chenoski Strikes Out Ten Batters While Fielders Give Fine Support; Is First Victory For Lodgements

Changed Line-up Injects New Pep Into Elks' Team and They May Surprise Fans—Second Time This Year Sons of Canada Have Lost No-Hit

Nick Chenoski, star pitcher for the Elks in the Senior League, entered the baseball hall of fame last night when he turned back the hard-hitting Sons of Canada without one player reaching first in the seven innings. He struck out ten batters, while four ground balls were handled by his infield. Farquhar, in centre-field, aided him by pulling off a sensational catch in the second inning on Stiles' hard hit drive. He made another nice catch in the fifth when Stiles lifted another ball to deep centre.

In the last half of the seventh, with a perfect game in sight, Nick was faced by Bury, Smith and Moran, lead-off batters for the Sons of Canada. Bury rolled one down to Barry at first. With two strikes and three balls against Smith, Chenoski seemed to put all he had into his pitching as Smith made two fouls and then let one go by to strike out. Moran, the last man up, also struck out to end the game.

The Elks' line-up was considerably changed and looked much stronger from a defensive point of view. Farquhar has moved out to centre-field and justified the shift by his performance last night. Alex Mitchell has taken Farquhar's place at short while Dingwell did the catching. This boy shows good prospects behind the plate while he lined out a timely two-bagger as well, last night. Nakamoto played second and covered the territory around the keystone sack in fine shape, accepting the only two chances that came his way.

Stiles did the mound duty for the losers and turned in a good game but his support was not the best in the world and seven runs were scored against him on seven hits.

Elks started right out in the first inning when Farquhar was safe on Moran's low throw on his grounder. Barry went out and then Alex Mitchell tripled to deep centre. A couple of miscues allowed Mitchell and Menzie to score before the inning ended. There was no more scoring until the sixth when they added four more runs. With Menzie and Arseneau on base, and none out, Stiles received instructions to walk Stephens. Dingwell, the next man up, drove one along the first base line, scoring Menzie and Arseneau. Stephens stopping at third while he made second. Farquhar drove both runners in with a hard driv play third.

It is a notable fact that Sons of Canada, who have won the city title for two years in succession, have had two no-hit games pitched against them this season, Jack Nelson having beaten them for Empress in the opening game of the

SPORT NOTES

Aside from sharing universal financial crisis, requiring curtailment of the athletic forces, the United States claims to have every advantage over its rival nations in the forthcoming contest for Olympic track and field honors at Los Angeles. On home soil, under known climatic conditions and with the least wielding of the pruning knife on the track and field contingent for economy's sake, sheer numbers may pile up a winning total on the unofficial 10-5-4-3-2-1 point basis. The chief test, however, will involve the extent to which the United States can regain foot racing laurels lost largely since the war to speedy sons of the British Empire.

The matchless ability of the Finns over the longer routes is conceded as well as admired but the loss of sprinting and middle distance running championships in the three Olympiads since the war has been a bitter pill for the United States to swallow. Consequently it is that United States' principal hopes in the track sport at Los Angeles are built on confidence that either Frank Wykoff or Emmet Toppino will dethrone Percy Williams as sprint king; that big Ben Eastman, the sensational Californian, will dominate the 400 and 800 metre races, where Britons like Hill, Rudd, Liddell and Lowe have shone and such Canadian stars as Alex Wilson and Phil Edwards add a threat; and that Gene Venzke, the new mile-running ace, will regain the classic 1500 metre crown which Great Britain passed on to Finland.

Williams, busily conditioning himself, may be difficult to unhorse. The Canadian ace has been beaten by Wykoff, Tolan and others since the 1928 Olympics, when he sprang unheralded to international fame but he is a great competitor in the "pinches." This was brought sharply to the fore when Williams, with a sensational burst of speed, won the 100 yards at the British Empire games in Hamilton two years ago. He pulled up lame and since then has had to condition himself slowly with the Los Angeles test in view. Wykoff's condition being doubtful, Toppino, the New Orleans boy, may be the best United States bet for the "100," with either Eddie Tolan or George Simpson an outstanding 200-metre choice. The newest sensations among United States sprinters, however, are Kiesel of California, and Metcalfe of Marquette. Eastman has the records as well as the championships at 400 and 800 metres at his mercy. If he holds anything like the form he has shown this spring for Stanford University.

Venzke looked like another world beater indoors but he will have the Finns as well as Thomas of Great Britain, a fine miler, to beat in the Olympics. Hallowell of Harvard, Brocksmith of Indiana and Nordell of New York University have been close to 4:12 for the mile. Beyond the 1500, the United States has no likely winner. The Finns, even without Paavo Nurmi, are considered outstanding in the distance races up to and including the marathon. Canada, however, as well as Germany, Japan and Argentina, should furnish top-notch contenders in the long grind that brings the games to a climax.

Despite the threat of a number of foreign stars, the United States is favored to win the pole vault, high jump, discus throw and perhaps the shotput. Japan may repeat in the hop, step and jump, and may also carry off the broad jump. The javelin is a Scandinavian specialty, although two California boys, Demers and Churchill, can surpass 220 feet and may score. The hammer throw likely will go again to the Irish star, Dr. O'Callaghan, and the Finns should take the deathlon. George Spitz, the ace of United States high jumpers, has an indoor record of 6 feet 8 1/2 inches. In the pole vault, Bill Graber and Lee Barnes of Southern California, are star performers, both with marks of better than 14 feet to their credit. The unofficial world discus throwing record, 169 feet, 8 1/2 inches, is held by Paul Jessup, former University of
