Canadian National Steamships Summer Schedule to Alaska Opened

VANCOUVER, June 14:—The summer service between Vancouver and Skagway was officially opened by the Canadian National Steamships when ss. Prince George, Capt. Neil MacLean, sailed from this port Monday evening. There was a good passenger list and it was a happy crowd who exchanged their hundreds of colored streamers with those on the farewell gallery as the ship slowly backed away from the pier with an orchestra supplying the music.

While a number of the passengers were booked to ports between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, the majority were ticketed through to Skagway. Many of the latter are leaving the ship at the northern terminus and will spend some time visiting the interior of the Yukon. Dawson, White Horse and the Lake Atlin territory.

One of the features of the first sailing was the inclusion in the passenger list of three honeymoon couples who arrived in the city on Monday from California.

The second Alaska sailing will be on Thursday evening when ss. Prince Rupert will make her maiden trip of the season.

G. E. Gulick, local manager of the Swift-Canadian Co., returned to the city on the Catala this morning after having made the round trip to Anyox and Stewart on company business.

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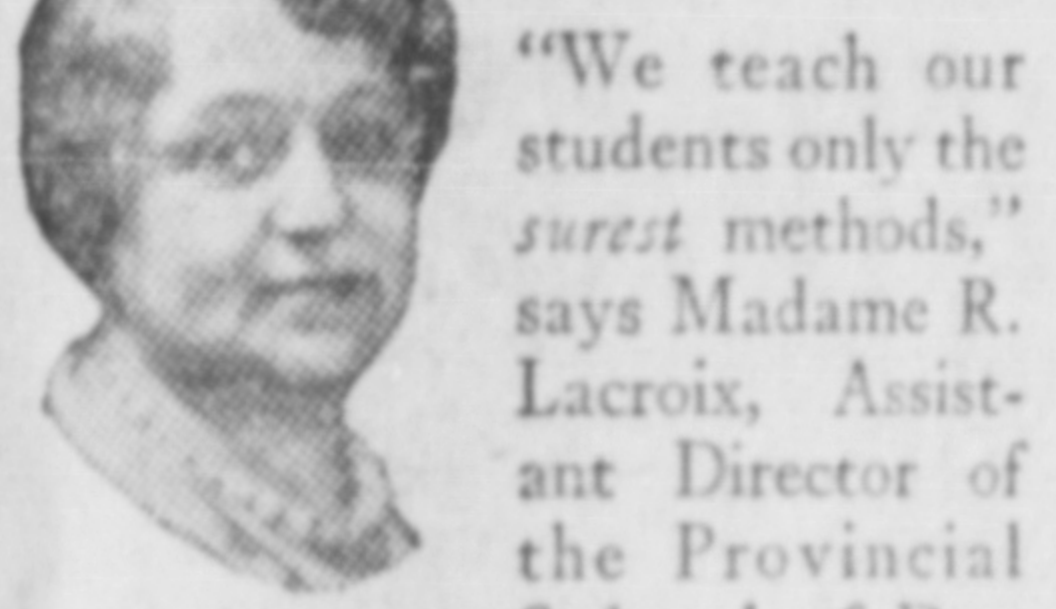
