**NEWS OF THE MINES**  
AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Consolidated Taking Outfit Into Slate Creek—Barney Mulvany Leading Large Party Into McConnell Creek—Mining in Omineca

The Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. is moving a large supply of placer mining equipment into Slate Creek in the Manson Creek placer area, the shipment consisting of pumps, gas engine and slack-line outfit for handling gravels. The equipment is being sent north on recommendation of Morley Ogilvie of the Consolidated engineering staff who has been in charge of the tests which have been conducted for the big company during several seasons. A wagon road was among the improvements in connection with plans for bringing the Slate Creek ground into production.

Displaying many fine samples of channel gold taken from a claim he and his partner own in the Cariboo district, Karl Johnson, a former resident of Forestdale, has been spending a couple of days in Smithers after an absence of several days from that district. For two years he has been working off and on on the development of his ground and with discoveries made last fall he is now confident that success is close at hand. In addition to coarse gold in the gravels of Willow River, Johnson also has some good looking quartz on the same property, his samples showing the rock to be richly impregnated with gold. At present, the property is being worked by his partner but Johnson is returning to his claims in a short time to join in the work. For the present they will sluice out some gold for a stake and, when this has been done, they intend to sink a shaft to bedrock for test and, if this stands up, they plan on equipping the property for hydraulic work.

In the party headed by Lyster Mulvany and J. J. Hepper of Burns Lake which passed through Vanderhoof last week enroute to the McConnell Creek gold diggings there are sixteen men. They are heading for Bulkley House from which point they plan on flying to their destination, this depending on whether or not the price for carrying freight by plane is lowered. If not, it will be taken the remainder of the way by pack train by which means it would take about twelve days to cover the last lap. Quite a number of the men going in are reported to be identified with the enterprise of Mickey Brown although others are going in on their own. The Bert McCorkell pack train is conveying the party and freight to Bulkley House and will continue the trip in the event of the planes not being used. The McCorkell pack train is taking another party into the same area, having left about the first of June. In some quarters interest in the McConnell Creek district is increasing and more parties are expected to leave Vanderhoof heading the same way.

On display at the government building in Smithers is a convenient rocker for use in extracting placer gold which is proving of interest to men who are contemplating trying their luck at panning the creeks in search for gold. The outfit being displayed by the government is extremely simple in construction. It has the advantage of being taken apart rapidly and the light weight makes it advantageous for those with little money for packing expenses.

Placer deposits as yet known in the Omineca Mining Division are mostly of the type requiring development on a large scale by such companies as the Consolidated which is now preparing for operation in the Vanderhoof district, it was stated by L. S. McGill of Smithers in a recent lecture. The McConnell Creek find, or re-discovery, is most promising according to the reports of M. J. Brown and his associates but it has not yet been confirmed from independent quarters, Mr. McGill said. In any event, it is not a poor man's proposition. Brown and his associates have the entire creek blanketed and it is 200 miles from the nearest transportation point except by airplane. Placer developments on Lorne Creek, 125 miles east of Prince Rupert, and on Nation and Manson Rivers were reviewed. Some are in the hands of individuals but mostly they are of the class requiring large operation. While existing prices for silver, lead and copper have stopped lode mining in the Omineca, a considerable amount of development has proceeded. On Hudson Bay

Mountain, immediately west of Smithers, the Glacier Guich, the Mamie and the Yukon and Jessie groups are all potential gold mines, Mr. McGill declared.

Eight hundred pounds of food was recently dropped by Pilot E. P. Wells of the Canadian Airways Limited from an altitude of 2000 feet onto a snowbank for the men at McConnell Creek diggings who ran out of provisions. The exploit was attended with considerable risk for the occupants of the plane as the flight had to be made in a canyon only 100 yards wide and too narrow to turn in, there being no open water upon which to make a landing. Pilot Wells' experience in dropping bombs during the Great War stood him in good stead in working out the problem of ensuring the safe landing of the food supplies. The door of the plane was taken off in order to permit the food to be taken out.

**Prince George Appeals Are on Victoria List**

Among appeals being heard at a session of the British Columbia Court of Appeal now in progress in Victoria are two involving judgements given by Judge H. E. A. Robertson in County Court at Prince George. One appeal is that of Burrows vs. Brooks Construction and Transportation Co. et al and the other Cusack vs. Brooks Construction and Transportation Co. et al. Counsel for the appellant in each case is E. C. Mayers, K. C. of Vancouver while P. E. Wilson, K. C. of Prince George is counsel for the respondent.

Another appeal of northern interest is that of Graham Island Timber Co. Ltd. vs. Brown, being an appeal from a judgement of W. H. S. Dixon of the Court of Revision in Vancouver.
