# Stevens Resolution In House of Commons Aims to Help Trade

Canadian Delegates to Imperial Conference to Be Urged to Initiate and Support Measures For Strengthening Empire

OTTAWA, Feb. 16:-House of Commons yesterday adopted a resolution of Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, that Canadian delegates to the Imperial Conference be instructed to initiate and support measures for the stabilization of the currency of all British countries in such a manner as to facilitate trade within the Empire.

### JAPANESE LOSE OUT

Driven From Miaochangchen Sector Shortly After Midnight; Fighting During Day Desultory

SHANGHAI, Feb. 26:-In a slashing counter-attack just before midnight, the Chinese drove the enemy out of Miaochangchen sector Saturday morning and held on against desultory machine gun fire.

Except for occasional sniping, Friday was quiet in Shanghai.

The warring forces seemed to be preparing themselves for renewal of the conflict. While there was little in the way of actual fighting, the air was filled with tenseness. Both sides were moving troops to points of vantage.

Province Owes Eight Millions and Has Only Million to Pay Pattullo Claims

VICTORIA, Feb. 26- Public accounts of British Columbia up to March 31 last showed that the government owed \$8,000,006 and had cash in the bank of only \$1,000,000 with which to pay the bills, T. D. Pattullo leader of the opposition, argued before the public accounts committee yesterday.
