Today, 80 years after the epochnaking discovery of the five-ounce gold nugget, and within a scant half-mile of the Skidegate Indian village, the home of the direct descendants of the history-making Haida Indian girl, a gold quartz property known as the Skidegate-Sunrise, consisting of eight mineral claims, is being developed by the Kitsault-Eagle Mines Ltd. Surface stripping has exposed the main vein for 1000 feet on its strike, and surface sampling has given gold values as high as \$35 across 12 feet.

Ore has been opened up on the 25, 50 and 100-foot levels, and it is confidently expected the whole ore body will mill around \$15 per ton. A recent test shipment to Trail showed a head analysis of .74 ounces of gold to the ton, or \$14.80. A larger shipment to Denver, Col., gave results similar to that of Trail. The Trail test showed a recovery of 35.8% of the gold by straight floation, while the Denver test showed a recovery of 92.6% by a combination of amalgamation, flota-! tion and tabling. Further cyanide tests are expected to increase the percentage of recovery.

Rich Pockets

Some sensationally rich pockets of gold have been found on the property. One lot of 140 pounds of ore returned \$582, or at the rate of \$8000 per ton. Another lot of 900 pounds returned over \$1100, or at the rate of \$2400 to the ton. Development is by three shafts,

two of which have been sunk to the 50-foot level and one, the main. to the 100-foot level. The south drift from the main shaft has been connected with the Indian shaft by a raise, thus providing good ventilation. A total of over 1000 feet of drifts, crosscuts, shafts and raises have been completed.
