## INSURANCE FOR BRITISH UNEMPLOYED DESCRIBED IN INTERESTING TALK

Before a Rotary Club audience yesterday afternoon, Dr. J. Wesley Bready, author and lecturer of Toronto, gave a brilliant and inspiring address on "The Unemployment Insurance and Dole." He was emphatic in his remarks concerning the unfair criticism that had been aimed at a system which had originally served so magnificently the working class of Great Britain and concluded by stating that some plan would have to be made to separate the real insurance from the extended insurance or doles from the state.

He began his talk by outlining the first unemployment act passed in 1911, which, since its enactment, has had 21 modifying acts. In 1909, Dr. Bready said, the disease of industry had to be grappled with and the chairman of the Board of Trade submitted a further and more balanced policy as did Churchill. A still better one was suggested in 1910, a policy based on the well-known life, fire and automobile insurances.

But it was in 1911 that the civilized world first saw real unemployment insurance enacted. True, there had been experiments in Switzerland but, the speaker said, it was in Great Britain that the legislative act had been placed on the statute books. It had remained to this day as the basis of sane unemployment insurance. At first it was insurance with contributions from the worker, the employer and the state. The worker paid the equivalent to five cents per week, the employer the same and the state one-fourth of the total sum. The unemployed could not draw insurance until six payments had been made and not until he had been out of employment a week. So successful was this early unemployment insurance that after but one year and a half there had accumulated a profit in the treasury of £3,250,000. It had turned out to be better, the speaker declared, that the legislators had dared to hope.

### Outbreak of War

At the outbreak of the war more than 1,000,000 women became munition workers and they were given the privilege of the insurance. Then, in 1919, at the signing of armistice, the government proud in victory, optimistic and in a remunerative mood, offered free insurance to private soldiers. Dr. Bready stated. Profits still ran into the millions and there seemed no end to the supply. The next step proved a slip, for the government remaining in this satisfied state, enacted legislation to provide more or less free insurance to civilians unemployed who had not paid premiums. This had occurred in 1918 and was, the speaker intimated, the first deviation from a well conceived plan and the beginning of trouble. In 1920 came an act universalizing the

principle and this in the shadow of a great economic depression resulted in the profits dwindling, the treasury emptying and gradually, a heavy debt appearing. Things had become so tangled, Dr. Bready explained, that three and four acts would be passed within a single year in order to try and improve conditions. When Miss Margaret Bondfield was minister of labor in 1930 additional acts were passed making it impossible for any worker who could get work to draw dole, and today, the speaker continued, the government had plenty of checks so that contrary to the general belief, men could not be on the dole and at the same time work.

### High Tariffs

Dr. Bready gave a heated account of the ignorant views that have been expressed on this troublesome question and mentioned, too, how Great Britain had been made a victim of high tariffs, a "country with free imports without free trade."

"The time has come," Dr. Bready said, "for both an honest business-like unemployment insurance and a separate dole." This would have to come in order to save the good name of the insurance, he said. Great Britain's social heritage had been the most inspiring the world had ever known and, after the wonderful work and traditions of Lord Shaftsbury and Dr. Barnardo, the people were not likely to neglect their unemployed.

At the close, President G. H. Munro, who was in the chair, thanked Dr. Bready heartily on behalf of the club for his fine address. There were numerous guests as well as a full attendance of members at the luncheon.
