STANLEY CUP, EMBLEMATIC OF PRO PUCK SUPREMACY, REMAINS IN CANADA FOR ANOTHER YEAR

First Time in History It Has Been Captured By Three-Game Straight Shut-out—New York Rangers Outclassed

TORONTO, April 11:—The Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, remains in Canada for another year as a result of the 6 to 3 victory of Toronto Maple Leafs on the home ice here Saturday night over New York Rangers. The Maple Leafs, who had toyed through the latter part of the league season and the semi-final play-offs, accomplished the feat, for the first time in Stanley Cup hockey history, of winning the final by the three-straight victory shut-out route.

Scoring six goals in each of the final games, the Maple Leafs, due to the work of their scintillating forwards, had a total of 18 goals in the three matches in comparison with nine for the Rangers.

The Torontons take the Stanley Cup from the Montreal Canadiens, who, crippled by injuries to some of their most valuable players, were eliminated by the New York Rangers in the early stages of the semi-finals.

MAX SCHMELING HAS COME OVER

NEW YORK, April 11:—Two pounds overweight but looking fit and fine, Max Schmeling, world's heavyweight boxing champion, arrived here at the week-end from Germany. He will start a brief exhibition tour at Chicago tonight and will go into training about May 10 for his next title bout.

RECORD IN HALF MILE

Ben Eastman, Crashing Second Record Within Fortnight, Sets New Time For 880 Yards

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11:—Ben Eastman, sensational Stanford University sprinter, broke his second record within the short space of two weeks when he did the 880-yard distance in one minute, 51 3-10 seconds during a three-college track meet at Stanford Oval on Saturday. Eastman clipped three-tenths of a second off the former record which was made in 1926 by a German runner.

Two weeks ago Eastman set up a new mark for the 440-yard sprint.

PHAR LAP POISONED

Australian Wonder Horse Was Not Victim of Indigestion But Rather of Arsenic

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11:—Continued investigations have practically confirmed the theory that Phar Lap, Australian wonder horse, who died last week at Menlo Park racing stables, was the victim not of colic and indigestion, as was at first supposed, but rather of arsenic poisoning used for spraying trees. Veterinaries have found traces of arsenic in Phar Lap's stomach.

Lumps of clay containing arsenic were also found in the bedding straw in Phar Lap's stall. Phar Lap's tenders state that the horse had a habit of munching clay.

Phar Lap had won the Agua Caliente \$50,000 Handicap a few weeks ago and was at Menlo Park in the course of a tour of American tracks.

Kergin Protests At Abolition of Agency at Anyox

H. F. Kergin, Liberal member of the Legislature for Atlin, protested in the House at Victoria last week at the recent abolition of the government agency at Anyox. He deprecated the arrangement under which men who were under obligation to the company acted as magistrate and coroner and controlled the town.

Hon. J. W. Jones, minister of finance, promised that the matter would receive attention.

HONOLULU TRIAL ON

Clarence Darrow Opposed By Imposing Array of Island's Legal Talent

HONOLULU, April 11:—With a most imposing array of Honolulu legal talent lined up against Clarence Darrow, celebrated Chicago criminal lawyer who is handling the defence, the trial of Mrs. Granville Fortescue, Lieut. Thomas H. Massie, her son-in-law and two United States naval seamen, E. J. Lord and A. D. Jones, who are accused of the murder of a Honolulu youth in the alleged "honor killing," got under way today when taking of evidence commenced. Practically all last week was taken up with the empanelment of a jury to hear the trial.

The youth, whom the party are accused of murdering, is alleged to have committed an offence against Massie's wife and Mrs. Fortescue's daughter.



BULLS IN INTERIOR

Fourteen Excellent Animals to Be Used For Breeding Purposes

PRINCE GEORGE, April 11:—The first consignment of pure-bred bulls to be loaned to farmers this year under the Dominion Government Bull Loaning Policy were distributed throughout the central interior along the Canadian National Railways line last week.

T. G. Stewart, Victoria, who has charge of this policy for the Dominion Government in B.C., shipped in 14 excellent Aberdeen Angus and Shorthorn animals, purchased at the recent Calgary bull sale.

These bulls were placed with farmers' clubs where the farmers agreed to establish a community breed centre. All stock on these farms are to be of the same breed and type, from which uniform carlots of commercial stock can be selected.

Three Angus bulls were placed at Engen, three at Endako, one Shorthorn at Prince George, one at Topley, two at Telkwa and four in the Burns Lake district. The Shorthorns were mainly of dual purpose breeding from dams with excellent milk records.

Two more shipments of bulls for distribution throughout this territory will follow at a later date. It is anticipated that about thirty bulls will be loaned to farmers in the central interior of B.C. by the Dominion Government this year.

Atlin Man Drops Dead in Vancouver

Thomas Kirkland Expires Suddenly In Restaurant in Southern City

Thomas Kirkland, justice of the peace at Atlin, in which district he has been engaged in mining and prospecting, collapsed last Tuesday evening in a restaurant in Vancouver, dying almost immediately. The man had been ill for some time and death was due to natural causes. An autopsy was made before burial took place.
