Acres of Destruction Greet Japanese While Advancing in China

Defenders Make Orderly Retreat Firing Buildings as They Go-Foreigners Sigh Relief as International Settlement Unhurt

ARE CEASING HOSTILITIES

SHANGHAI, March 3:—The Chinese government at Nanking notified the League of Nations assembly Friday that the Nineteenth Route Army had been instructed to cease hostilities in the Shanghai area unless it was attacked.

This move came shortly after the Japanese military and naval commands announced that their forces would discontinue fighting unless the Chinese launched an attack.

SHANGHAI, March 3:—All Chinese troops continued in full retreat from the Kiangwan-Chapei front today. The retreat was being made on instructions from the seat of the Nationaliist government at Nanking, it was revealed. It was understood that the Chinese would withdraw to well beyond the twelve and a half miles demanded by the
