Dropped First Game in Twelve Starts by Defeat at Hands of Detroit Tigers

DETROIT, June 10-In the opening game of a series here yesyesterday, Detroit Tigers inflicted upon the New York Yankees the first defeat they have suffered * during their last twelve starts in the West. Dan McFadden started on the mound for the Yankees and was replaced by Ed. Wells who finished the game, as a result of the victory, the Tigers moved back into third place ahead of the Philadelphia Athletics who lost by a margin of one run to the Cleveland Indians at Cleveland.

In the National League, Chicago Cubs were defeated by the Brooklyn Robins while Boston Braves lost to St. Louis Cardinals, there being, therefore, no change in the battle for the supremacy of the senior circuit.
