Many stories are told about Julius Rosenwald, head of the firm of Sears Roebuck, of Chicago, whose death is announced today.

Being Creamettes-The Finest without legal recourse against the dram shops, Mr. Rosenwald sought to render them ineffective through united Royal Crown Soap-6 bars action of the employees. At a mass meeting of the workers, Eggs-B.C. Fresh Extras an agreement was reached under which no one in the employ of the company would be allowed to enter a saloon within eight blocks of the establishment.

Eighteen months later, the nearest saloon was on a corner eight blocks from the main entrance of the mail order house. A huge sign in front of the saloon read "First Chance" on one side and on the other "Last Chance." The bar remained on the edge of the "agreement zone" until national prohibition came.

his known benefactions totalled \$25,000,000. When in 1922 he reached three score years, he celebrated his birthday by giving away \$687,-

He was a firm believer in giving so that the living would be benefitted. Foundations designed to aid future generations did not appeal

His interest in the negro was aroused by Booker T. Washington, famous negro educator and head of Tuskagee Institute. From donations to the institute, the interest developed into a campaign for primary and secondary schools for ne-

More than \$5,000.000 had been de-0 voted to the work by the end of c 1930 and 5,075 schools for negro children, housed in clean, modern, 0 airy buildings, dotted the southern states from Maryland to Texas.

Establishment in Chicago of the first negro Y. M. C. A. was largely through Mr. Rosenwald's efforts. After several years of successful operation of the institution, he made a standing offer of \$25,000 to any city which would raise \$125,000 for a similar Christian centre for negroes. As a result more than \$625,-000 was given by him for such buildings in many cities.

Mr. Rosenwald's Jewish charities were more direct and larger than his negro benefactions. He spent \$5,000,000 to help put Russian Jewish farmers back on land in the Crimea after they had been dislieved in the Zionist movement for

obstacles if we of the north country undertake the task seriously and energetically. The fathers of confederation undertook a large! order in framing the first government which united two peoples of different racial origin and different la guage into one composite whole. At that time they laid down certain principles which hold good oday with regard to the responsibilities of the dominion to the several provinces and territories responsibilities which have been more definitely stated in the acts establishing the governments of the several provinces.

"An important feature of these acts is the allocation of liabilities. either of the province or of the dominion. In this regard, if we at to ecasider the extent to which the provinces of Alberta and British Columbia have executed thei. trust in the administration of the north country, a cross-section view of the bonded indebtedness of both provinces will prove most enlightening. In the case of the province of Alberta, the bonded indebtedness of the province, amounting to approximately \$120,000,000, is found to be almost ortirely in connection with utilities and equipment in which the north country does not benefit except in so small a degree as to be wholly inconsiderable. Of that portion of our provincial bonded indebtedness in cornection with provincial telephones. we find a few thousand allocated to the Peace River country, and more than ninetyfive per cent. in the central and southern portions of the province. with which we are not even connected. In the the highway bonds we find a similar state of affairs. with not a single mile of standard highway in any part of the Peace River country, and with such substandard highways as have been given us representing only approximately the amount our own district has paid in gasoline taxes.
