Ring Out the Old, Ring in the New.

As a nation we have been passing through difficult times. The aftermath of the war has proved unsettling. Prince Rupert seems to have had a prosperous year. The merchants, speaking generally, have done well, although complaints have been made in some lines. Competition is very keen in certain trades and the result is something disastrous. There have been setbacks during the year. The strike, the ice shortage, occasional car shortages, delays at the shipbuilding plant, all tended to hold us back. The future looks rosy, however.

There are many who prophesy a very rapid growth for Prince Rupert. We are among the optimists, but we do not look for any boom. We see growth in the future, a steady normal to the above-mentioned lands, in the nat increase in population caused by the growth of our industries and the improvement of our transportation facilities.
