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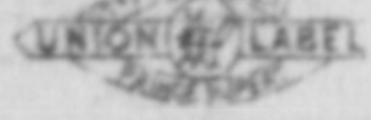

Growing Seed Southern B.C.

Peas Being Supplied From Northern Interior For Farmers in South Of Province

In an address given last night to the Chamber of Commerce, Harry Bowman, agricultural and colonization agent for the Canadian National Railways, told of an effort being made to secure the supplying of seed peas for Southern British Columbia from Central B.C. Something like thirty carloads of peas had to be imported annually from England or from Eastern Canada to supply the demand. The seed grown in Southern B.C. was not suitable.

To make a test the Dominion government had supplied farmers with from 12 to 16 bushels of seed peas and the resulting crops had been excellent. The seed from this product was now being tested in the lower mainland and, if successful, as was expected, it would give a nice return to the farmers who would specialize on growing this seed.

John W. Allen, superintendent engineer for the Dominion Fisheries, arrived in the city from Vancouver last evening in the course of a tour of coast points on official duties.

CHICAGO ON TOP AGAIN

Boston Braves Drop to Second Place in National League—Giants Leave Cellar

CHICAGO, May 7.—Chicago Cubs moved into first place in the National League yesterday by defeating Brooklyn Robins on the home grounds here while the Boston Braves were being subjected to another rout by the Cincinnati Reds at Cincinnati. Pittsburgh Pirates dropped into the cellar by losing to the Phillies while Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants are now tied for seventh place, the Giants having recorded a close victory over the champion St. Louis Cardinals at St. Louis.

New York Yankees moved back into third place in the American League by scoring a one-run shut-out over Detroit Tigers, Cleveland dropping to fourth place by losing to the Philadelphia Athletics. The Washington Senators, although defeated by Chicago White Sox, retained the league leadership over the Tigers by a safe margin of one and a half games.

NEWS OF THE MINES AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Interest Being Displayed in Dog Creek—McGill in Vancouver to Raise Finances For Jessie Group—Airplane in Atlin District Mining

Dog Creek 32 miles north of Vanderhoof, which was the scene of placer discoveries last season by prospectors who were on their way to Rainbow Creek, is attracting a good deal of interest right now and is due to be explored by several parties during the next few weeks. A few days ago, George Bruggy, formerly of Alice Arm, left Vancouver for Dog Creek, accompanied by J. M. Greenwood and William McFarlane, also of Vancouver. The party took a motor truck loaded with sufficient supplies to last all summer. Mr. Bruggy, who passed through Prince Rupert recently enroute to Vancouver from Alice Arm, is very optimistic in regard to prospects at Dog Creek.

L. S. McGill, well known Smithers barrister and mining man, is at present in Vancouver making arrangements for further financing of development work on the Jessie gold mine on Hudson Bay Mountain near Smithers. The people of Smithers have already put up \$6000 which is considered a splendid showing for a town of such a size. Values run from \$10 to \$15 per ton on the Jessie property. Mr. McGill stated in Vancouver. Mr. McGill is very enthusiastic for the future possibilities of the mine and is highly pleased with the response of the Smithers people to his appeal for finances. On the board of directors of the Jessie mine are such prominent Smithers citizens as J. G. Stephens, L. S. McGill, Wesley Banta, Stanley B. Rutland, Mrs. Jessie M. McGill, L. H. Kenney and S. J. Mayer.
