## HIGH SUGAR PRICES ARE TO BE EXPECTED

Control Will be Withdrawn in States Jan. 1 and Sharp Bidding is to be Expected.

The decontrolling of sugar in the United States, which will become effective on January 1 with the lapsing of the Food Control regulations, will unquestionably have a very marked effect on sugar and sugar prices especially as they apply to Canada. It is pretty generally agreed that the American refiners as a rule have not purchased their necessary supplies for 1920, and that, therefore, with the opening of the new crop, there will be keen bidding for available stocks; also that with the price limits that have prevailed in past years removed there may be expected to be a sharp upward trend in prices. A good deal of capital has been made of the largely increased estimated yield of the Cuban sugar plantations, but while this is a fact it is offset by failures in other sugar producing sources. With the old crop practically gone and the new still upward of a month away, the stocks available in prospect have been depleted to the extent of one and a quarter, to one and a half million tons under contract to European countries and the Far East, and to a lesser extent to this continent. Roughly speaking, a third of the Cuban crop, which is the big factor in the sugar market, has been contracted for and the bidding of refiners has hardly commenced.

While there have been sugar shortages in certain localities in Canada, it has not been as a result of any actual shortage of supplies. The consumption of sugar has never been as extensive in Canada as it has been this year. Even in Winnipeg, one of the localities that suffered from the shortage this year according to the statement of W. F. O'Connor of the Board of Commerce, the receipts of sugar this year have been 75 per cent. in excess of last year's consumption. In Canada there has been an enormously increased consumption limited only by local shortages, while in the United States there have been restrictions on consumption for some time past. ## Sport Briefs

Con Jones has offered the Newcastle United football team, the first division stars of the English League, a flat guarantee of \$5,000 for three matches to be played in Vancouver during the coming summer. The Newcastle intend to make a tour of Canada next year if finances can be arranged satisfactorily. All receipts above this amount, Con Jones stipulates, are to go to the schools of the city of Vancouver to foster the soccer game among the boys. The games it is expected will commence June 19.

The University of Chicago ball team, it is expected, will make another tour of the Orient this summer. It is planned to leave Chicago in June, play on the way to the coast at various cities and towns and then embark from San Francisco on the trans-Pacific trip. China, Hawaii and the Philippines will, probably, be visited also.

Speaking of George Carpentier as a challenger for the World's Heavy Weight Championship, George McDonald, the famous English sportsman, recently said in New York, "I have seen a great many fighters but in his fight against Beckett recently, Carpentier convinced me that he ranked with any of the best of them. He worked like a master and did not make an unnecessary move. The blow that ended Beckett's interest in the fight did not travel more than a foot. Any man who feels the full impact of his blows must experience defeat. The only thing that can save Dempsey will be missing Carpentier's full force because he has a mighty punch."

The Stanford University Football Club, of California, which made such a clean-up on the University of British Columbia on Saturday last will meet a Victoria representative team on Friday, January 2. They will play at the capital city on the afternoon of the day they catch the steamer "President" home to California. It is probable that the Victoria team may put up a more present-

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and 5 acres of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 50 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stampage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the date of such person's death to one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due of payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, including taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim when original purchasers purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Numbers ranging; priority for established owners. Stock-owners' management Associations formed; permits must. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
