

Impartial critics assert Oxford's rowing morale is at a low state. Col. Gibbon, a famous Cambridge coach, has been in charge of the Oxford crew and he has not hesitated to make frequent changes. But the Dark Blues have been disappointing in practice and one critic declares if Oxford is to win they will have to show a remarkable improvement in the last stage of
