

A SATURDAY SERMON

A Model For the Multitude

(Rev. Dr. F. W. Dafoe, Minister, First Baptist Church)

In the Eighteenth Century William Pitt said: "England will not be saved by any one man." Premier Stanley Baldwin during his term of office repeated this same saying in the Twentieth Century. An axiom is imbedded in it. No person, at any time, in any place, completes an undertaking. God did not in the hour of creation. Christ did not in the hour of redemption. One by one, a multitude follow. For each of these there is need of competency.

In the building of churches competency, whether in leader or follower, comes from the Pauline experience described in the words: "Christ liveth in me." On an historic day during the Peninsular Wars a young English officer, waving his sword in the air, shouted to a group of British soldiers, halted by fear: "Follow me," and put his horse to the barricade behind which the men of the French were flashing. The heroism of Havelock would not have saved the day in that hour had it not been for the heroism in those who then followed him to victory. No church will be led to great heights by its leader alone. Christ liveth in the leader alone. Christ liveth in the multitude.

On a recent day in a manse in Kent, England, Pastor A. J. Houshouser wrote:

Never one man achieves, the good for ages due; One dreams his mighty dream, ten thousand make it true. And not one man alone, man's care of man achieves; One watches through the dark and one his watch relieves. For not our God alone, the good in man retrieves; He stepping from his throne, man's help for man receives. The pattern in the web, the master-mind conceives, Through shuffling centuries, man for his brother weaves. All men for every man, a singing multitude, Work out the shining plan, achieve the eternal good."

He who leads must be able to say: "Christ liveth in me." And none can follow well unless he can say: "Christ liveth in me." That church alone is great of which it can be said truthfully: "Christ liveth in it."

It is this experience of Christ which leads to efficiency in the group, effects the completion of God's undertakings and gives a realization to the divine Presence and Partnership.

Efficiency in the group requires a basis of individual efficiency. The individual life is efficient only when it is efficient in every part—in individual self-control, impulse and inspiration; in family relations and obligations; in social contacts and duties; in religious harmonies.
