## ARRANGING

Details of Schmeling - Sharkey Fight in New York During Summer Being Lined Up

NEW YORK, Jan. 21:-The New York Boxing Commission having given the bout its stamp of approval, arrangement of details for the long-looked-for heavyweight title bout between Max Schmeling, the champion, and Jack Sharkey are now proceeding.

The fight will take place in Madison Square Garden in June, the definite date having not been set as yet. It will be a fifteen-1round bout.


