WAS WELL BALANCED

Ancestry Made Fortunate Welding For Career of William Southam

There was something significant in the birth of the late William Southam, who died at the week-end in Hamilton, to sturdy British parents upon their arrival in a new land. Throughout his life the spirit of the old country, with its staunch conservatism and tolerant attitude towards the world and its weaknesses, was to be seen mingling with the adventurous, aggressive spirit of the younger country. This fortunate welding of metals produced a sterling character, urbane, yet exacting where the best should be exacted, aggressive and unswerving but spurning all means of advancement that might be seized by the opportunist.

He loved news work and went at it with a zeal which attracted attention and earned the commendation of the heads of the London Free Press who eventually took him into partnership. In 1877 an opportunity arose to purchase the Hamilton Spectator. With the late William Carey as his partner he grasped it, and they became joint owners.

In 1883 the firm acquired the Toronto Mail Job Printing Company and not long afterwards established a printing plant in Montreal. The Southam Press Montreal, Limited, and the Southam Press Toronto Limited, are now two of the largest and most successful printing plants in Canada. In 1896 Mr. Southam purchased the Ottawa Citizen, and subsequently acquired control of the Calgary Herald, the Edmonton Journal, the Winnipeg Tribune and the Vancouver Province, which publications, with the Hamilton Spectator, form the group now known as The Southam Newspapers.

As Mr. Southam's publishing interests developed he retired from all of his other industrial enterprises and devoted himself exclusively to the businesses of publishing and printing. He was a keen student of world affairs and an omnivorous reader. The manifold activities which claimed Mr. Southam's interest are themselves a testimony to his astonishing versatility. He was always a keen sportsman, and in later life he was well known figure on bowling green and curling rink. As a militia lieutenant he took part in the Fenian Raid operations, and his Fenian Raid medal was always a proud possession.

He was a member of the Hamilton Club; the Tamahaac Club, and the Hamilton Golf and Country Club; a vice-president of the Hamilton Cricket Club and one of the organizers of the famous Hamilton Thistle Club. He was an Anglican, a member of Christ Church Cathedral parish, and an active supporter of church work; and sympathetically gave both of his time and means for educational and other public services.

Mr. Southam had six sons and one daughter; the late Major Gordon Hamilton Southam commanded the 40th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery, Third Division, and was killed in action at Albert, France, in 1916. The other sons actively engaged in the publishing and printing businesses established by their father, Wilson M. and H. S. of Ottawa; F. N. of Montreal; Richard of Toronto, and William J. of Hamilton. The only daughter is Mrs. St. Clair Balfour of Hamilton, Ont.
