WORKLESS MEETING

Serious Straits of Both Single and Married Men Reviewed
"NIGGER IN WOOD PILE"

Victoria to be Communicated With—Married Men to Convene

An enthusiastic meeting of the National Unemployed Workers' Association was held in the hall of the Canadian Labor Defense League last night when some 400 men packed the place to capacity.

In his opening remarks, the chairman, Charles Chapman, said that there had been no change in the situation confronting the unemployed and particularly those of this district. The shoes and clothing, which had been promised the men, were not yet forthcoming. Neither had the needs of the married men, who are working for the city in return for their subsistence, been met.

A letter from the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association in reply to a previous letter from the National Unemployed Working Association, asking their endorsement of a petition which was being circulated asking that needy children be given one hot meal daily in school, was read. The Parent Teachers expressed their willingness to meet the Association in this matter and the secretary, T. W. Murphy was instructed to make arrangements for a meeting with the Parent Teachers' Association to discuss the proposition.

Mr. Chapman reported that, on a recent visit to Smithers, he had been instrumental in setting up a local at that point. The combined membership of the locals at Smithers, Stewart and Rupert was now over 550.

W. Mahoney reported for the delegation which had met the City Council to present the case for the married men working for the city in return for relief. They had also taken up the matter of free medical attention. In the discussion which ensued it was felt by many present that, in regard to the hold-

ing up of the clothing, there was a "nigger in the wood pile" and suggestions of possible grafting were expressed. It was felt that this was less a matter for the city than for the provincial government which in the opinion of the men, was the responsible party and, on motion of George Murray, the secretary was instructed to write to Victoria and also to the Island headquarters of the National Unemployed Workers' Association in an endeavor to find out just what lay behind the delay in supplying the long promised shoes and clothing.

Case of Married Men
The case of the married men was dealt with at considerable length. Their plight was shown to be even more desperate than that of the single men. In order to perform the work which the city asks of them, replacement of clothing is absolutely necessary as is also a guarantee against eviction for non-payment of rents. In order to arrive at a concrete plan of action it was decided that there should be a meeting of the married men on Sunday.

A report having been received that two men had been threatened with curtailment of their direct relief for non-payment of rent was referred to the central committee for investigation and immediate action.

W. Mahoney tendered his resignation as a member of the central committee. This was received with deep regret and Mr. Mahoney was thanked for his untiring efforts on behalf of members of the association. Mr. Mahoney is taking up important duties in connection with the organization in the south.

The determination to stand out against the government's offer of \$7.50 per month was reiterated. This is the resolution which the city council endorsed at a recent meeting.

Under good and welfare on the agenda, there were lively talks and discussions which indicated the keen interest being taken in current affairs of political economy. Speakers under this heading were Oscar Larsen, George Murray and Neil Lang.

The meeting adjourned at 11 p. m. with the singing of the Red Flag.

Nootka Packing Co.'s Salmon Cannery at New Massett to Operate at Half Capacity This Year

O. S. Morris, manager of the Nootka Packing Co.'s cannery at Massett, who is a visitor in Prince Rupert, announces that the company has just finished putting up a pack of 10,000 cases of halves at its clam cannery at Tow Hill near Massett. This was good deal larger than the pack of clams last year.

Mr. Morris intimates that it is the intention of the company to operate the salmon cannery at Massett at only half capacity this year owing to general market conditions. Two seinboat crews will be operated as compared with four last year.

The intention of the company, Mr. Morris states, is to spread the work out as far as possible and steps are being taken with this end in view.

Mr. Morris will return to Massett on the Prince John tomorrow night.
