in favor of the amendment, but just before this vote was taken, Mr. Woodworth got up and accused the Prime Minister of a libel when, during the course of his speech, he had endeavored to place the blame on Hon. Vincent Massey, as being the author of a pamphlet which was being issued throughout the country and had also linked the name of Mr. Massey with the league for social reconstruction. The Prime Minister, he declared, had represented this as a new political alignment of some kind and that this manifesto had been delivered to the faithful in a lecture which Mr. Vincent Massey had given to the Canadian Club. Mr. Woodworth pointed out that the league for social reconstruction was an association which had been formed in Canada, similar to what is known as the Fabian Society of Great Britain and that the manifesto had been published in the April number of the Canadian Forum. He was subjected to quite a lot of interruptions and, as it was 11:05, he asked the Speaker to

call it 11 o'clock which under the rules of the House the Speaker could not refrain from doing and which meant that the House went home with mingled feelings as the final voting on the amendment to the budget had yet to take place.

**Joy Trip Denied**

Thursday, April 23—The day previous, when the orders of the day were called, the Prime Minister rose to correct the statement which had appeared in the press to the effect that some members of parliament and some senators were having a joy trip to Bermuda. The Prime Minister deprecated statements such as these as the facts of the matter were that these men were going as the guests of the government of Bermuda who were paying all the expenses of the men, as delegates to the Parliamentary Convention which meets there.

Immediately after the Premier had spoken, Mr. King also rose in reference to a statement which had been made in the press to the effect that he and the Prime Minister were not on speaking terms. This, he said, was not correct. I mention this, because when the House opened on Thursday Mr. King was seen busily engaged in conversation with R. B. The whole of the day was taken up with estimates. The Minister of Labor introduced a bill for the continuation of the "blank cheque" for another year, much comment being made by many members when the information was elicited from the Minister of Labor that only direct relief was to be given throughout Canada and that an employed relief work was not to be carried out on the same scale as the previous year.

The evening session was taken up by estimates of the Post Office, and was participated in mostly by members from the Province of Quebec. From the warm discussion made in the French language by some of those members, one could draw from them that they were airing many grievances of a political nature in connection with the dismissal of postmasters, the information being given the House that, since the Postmaster-General has taken office, over 600 have been dismissed, 450 of these dismissals being of a political nature. There were not many members in attendance during the evening sitting on account of the fact that Senator Meighen was scheduled to speak in the Senate in connection with the three senators who have been accused of participating in the funds from the Beauharnois Power Corporation, and it would appear evident from the remarks made that a move is going to be made to have these Senators resign their positions in the Senate. The House adjourned at 11 o'clock still discussing postmasters' estimates.

**MAKES PLEA FOR MANUAL**

Eric Gee Tells Rotary Club About Work in Which He Has Engaged Here

Expressing the belief that even yet it was not too late to reconsider the recent decision of the school board to abolish the Manual Training Department of the Public Schools and stating that John Kyle, supervisor of technical education, would be in the city soon to take the matter up, Eric Gee, manual training instructor in the city schools, gave an interesting address on his work and its value from an educational point of view before the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Gee emphasized the value of physical education, combined with mental, moral and spiritual, and showed how manual training provided an outlet for each. Formerly mental training was the only side of education on which the schools specialized. Now they were getting away from that. He feared that, if Prince Rupert once dropped the work, it would be difficult to get back to it.

Dealing with the physical training given the youths, Mr. Gee explained that all the muscles were exercised. The creative spirit was developed and mistakes were dearly paid for. Students were taught to profit by these mistakes and to plan ahead.

In addition to the physical training, good habits were developed and appreciation of beauty of form was a spiritual outcrop. Manual training makes arithmetic practical.

Illustrating how the boys like manual training work, six months ago they discovered that May 24 fell on a manual training day and they would therefore lose that much time. The biggest trouble-makers in school were often the best at this other work because it directed their natural activities in a manner that could not be done in the other classes. It was not natural for any boy to sit at a desk all day.

Mr. Gee also said that he had found that boys who ranked low in their other studies and were rapidly
