Prices went down with a run, and even gilt-edged securities experienced a serious set-back. Mr. Badwin had to make a reassuring statement in the House. The second example comes nearer home. On May 17, 'The Times' correspondent cabling from Ottawa announced that Mr. Bennett had said that 'during the summer a very difficult situation might arise in this continent and it might be necessary for the government to come to the support of certain institutions." The cable was somewhat unfortunately headed 'Canada and Financial Crisis' and its effect was to set on foot the wildest whisperings. Brokers home from the latest rumor of the 'Street' telephoned their clients that receivers had been appointed now to this Canadian corporation and that. The damage done to Canadian credit was enormous. The situation brought forth a cable from Mr. Bennett, a special statement from the High Commissioner and an inspired leader in 'The Times.' It cannot be said that these expedients have had an entirely satisfactory effect, and an under-current of suspicion still remains."
