chers have made a very fair offer to the board, and more than any other city in the province has done.

"With regard to cutting out the 'Educational Prills' it may be possible to do this although it will upset some 46 pupils who are now taking the domestic science option. Then again by cutting out our commercial classes we would not gain, as the classes now there would simply transfer to the high school course, which would entail the engaging of one or more high school teachers, and so the saving as outlined by Mr. Rorie would not amount to much. The trouble seems to be that recommendations are being made by people who do not begin to understand the work of the trustees but just fly off at random with all sorts of very nice suggestions, impossible for a board to carry out.

"With regard to the janitors. These men work long hours and are busy all day. There is no eight-hour day here, as during cold weather, for instance, they are on the job seven days a week, and on ordinary days are going from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. or later, to get through their work and keep the schools clean and sanitary.

"Our estimates for this year amount to \$80,975.46, and with the trust account of 3% donated by the teachers from September 1 to January 31, amounting to \$1021.99, deducted leaves a total of \$79,953.47. Deducing this from our estimates for 1931, namely, \$93,930.00 it makes a strain reduction of \$13,976.53 so from this the school mill rate should be down. The provincial government will pay the city this year 33 1-3% of teachers salaries for January, February and March, and will pay 25% for the other seven months of the year. This will amount to a little over \$17,000.00 and with a small amount still to be collected from senior matriculation pupils, will leave the city about \$62,500.00 to raise by taxation, which naturally should give the taxpayers a better rate for schools if taxed according to requirements. During the past civic year the city received from the provincial government for teachers' salaries \$20,872.30, and as Mr. Rorie states that the collections were about 85% there should have been ample money for school purposes for the past year, and there should be a surplus on hand now if the money collected were used for school purposes only."
