VICTORIA, April 7:-The Legislature may be reduced by one seat if present plans are embodied in amendments to the Constitution Act which will be presented to the House shortly. One new seat in the Peace River will be added and one on the lower mainland by re-arrangement of boundaries west of Dewdney while three will be eliminated by elision of two ridings in each case. This will give a membership of 47 in the House instead of 48 as at pre-


