## BASKETBALL IS EXCITING

Several Close Games Played Last Night in Various Leagues

### Amazons Lose

C.N.R.A. Played Brilliantly to Defeat Panthers 39 to 35

The spectators were thrilled last night by one of the fastest cards of basketball staged this season. Speed was the keynote of all the games.

With but a few minutes to go the Panthers climbed within two points of their victors, but the C.N.R.A. returned with another beautiful piece of play to end the game 39-35.

Mr. Nickerson pointed out that last year's accounts of fishermen only eight per cent remained unpaid, which, considering the conditions, was a very good showing. The men could not get credit for the year many of them could not get. The resolution will be sent to Henry Thornton and the Minister of Railways.
