LIBER 'S ADMITTED TO MANITOBA FARMER GOVERNMENT

River Tren. Its Banks and Villages In Lincoln Flooded

More Than Six Hundred Families Homeless Around Doncaster-Damage of \$2,000,000 Done in Other Areas-Situation Improving

LONDON, May 27:-The River Trent overflowed its banks today and flooded villages in the neighborhood of Gainsborough in Lincolnshire, an area hitherto immune to floods which have swept the Midlands. Water rose into the lower floors of houses. The flooding of the Trent followed subsidance of waters in other inundated areas which suffered damage to the ex-

tent of about \$2,000.000 last week. More than two hundred families CURTIS IS are still homeless around Doncaster. Yorkshire, but the situation is improving daily.
