Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert

January 28, 1912

Sir George Doughty of Grimsby, England, and his son, Wilfrid Vere Doughty, chairman of the board of directors and general manager respectively of the British Columbia Fisheries Ltd., which company has been recently formed with capitalization of \$1,250,000 to engage in the fisheries of the Northern British Columbia coast, are expected to arrive here shortly. They will take over the cannery, saltery and all works of Simon Fraser & Co. in Cumshewa Inlet and also plan other fisheries developments in this district.

The G. T. P. steamer Henriette has arrived from Vancouver with transformer and other equipment necessary to increase in the current production of the city electric light plant at Cow Bay.

A dispatch from Montreal says that Stewart has been settled upon as the northern terminus of the Canadian Northern Railway and the outlet for the Peace River district.

THIS YEAR CRITICAL

Plenty To Happen in 1932, Parisienne Clairvoyant Predicts

PARIS, Jan. 28.—The year of 1932 will be a critical one, "disquieting, filled with accidents and difficulty of all sorts," in the belief of Mme. Therese Girard, a well-known Parisian clairvoyante.

Since she was the foreteller of the death of Marshal Joffre, the exile of King Alfonso and the proclamation of the Spanish Republic, on the threshold of 1931, the superstitiously inclined are prone to take her predictions seriously.

Among the more specific of her predictions are:

"Momentary" settlement of the Sino-Japanese conflict.

Two outstanding bank failures—the one she believes that "the epoch of financial scandals seems closed for the time being."

The death of a "great French soldier." (General Pau died early this month)

The deaths of two notable French politicians, "one of whom occupies a particularly elevated position." (The French Minister of War died recently.)

The presence in the French premiership of "a man whose influence will be happy."

In Italy, Mme. Girard looks for renewed volcanic activity by Vesuvius, "and also a grave attempt at assassination, which will go wrong." (Vesuvius is erupting more actively now.)

In Britain she signals the appearance of a new politician whose action will be beneficial.

For her own country, she predicts some landslides, but maintains that the "aura," the luminous something hovering over France as she sees it, is a formal indication that otherwise all will be well.
