


Phar Lap, Australian Wonder Horse

WINNIPEG WIN FIRST

LAKE PLACID, N.Y., Feb. 4.—Canada's Olympic hockey team, the Winnipeggers, defeated the United States team by a score of 2 to 1 in overtime today at the opening of Olympic Winter Games. The amateur hockey series will be continued during the course of the Olympiad in the next few days.

SPORT CHAT

The season's playing schedules for the American and National baseball leagues have been announced this week by the league moguls. The season in both leagues will open on April 12. In the National League Boston will play on the opening day at Brooklyn, Chicago at Cincinnati, Pittsburg at St. Louis and Philadelphia at New York. In the American League the opening day will see St. Louis playing at Chicago, Cleveland at Detroit, Boston at Washington (April 11), New York at Philadelphia and Washington at Boston. The season in both leagues will close on September 25 with the World Series ensuing immediately.

Delegates to the annual meeting of the Ontario Football Association sanctioned a substitute rule for the first time in the history of the association. Use of three alternative players by each team in the Ontario Cup competition will be permitted in future. The new rule compels each club in the competition to carry 14 players. Each substitute can only be used once during a game, and on no occasion can a replaced player return to the field. In the event of a player being injured, he may be replaced but he cannot participate in the game again.

CHANGES IN ASSEMBLY

New Lieutenant Governor Will Officiate For First Time—Nova Scotia Government Line-up Will Be Changed

HALIFAX, February 4.—Several changes will be noted at the opening of the fourth session of Nova Scotia's seventeenth legislature since confederation.

No date has been set, but it is customary to start the sessions in February or early in March. Last year the opening date was February 19.

Hon. W. H. Covert, who succeeded the late Hon. Frank Stanfield as Lieutenant Governor of the province, will officiate in the legislature for the first time since his appointment.

The front line of the government forces has been shuffled many times since the Conservatives were swept into power in 1925, and this year a number of ministers will be in seats new to them.

Col. the Hon. Gordon S. Harrington will face the assembly for his second session as prime minister, but he will be without his former first lieutenant and attorney general Hon. W. L. Hall, who now is a justice of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. In Justice Hall's place will be Hon. John Doull, who resigned his position as provincial secretary to become attorney general. Hon. J. Fred Fraser, formerly chairman of the Nova Scotia Power Commission, will appear as provincial secretary. Dr. Ferguson

Little, Halifax physician, not a member of the assembly, has been appointed a member of the power commission, but it is understood Premier Harrington will assume the responsibilities of chairman. Hon. Joseph McDonald, member for Cape Breton Centre, will move up to the front benches as minister of the government without portfolio.

The opposition line-up will appear much the same as last year. A. S. McMillan, veteran debater, and former minister of highways in the Armstrong government, will lead the Liberal forces. He will have the able support of William Chisholm, K. C., who resigned the leadership last year because of ill-health. Mr. Chisholm has been in better health the last few months and is expected to take an active part in legislative battles this winter.

Angus L. McDonald, former professor of law, who succeeded Mr. Chisholm as chief of the Liberals in the province, is not a member of the assembly but he will be a prominent figure during the session. He will occupy a seat at the right of his followers in one of the chairs reserved for distinguished visitors. Last year Mr. McDonald was on the floor nearly every minute the house was in session. He was in the fray from start to finish, although he was not permitted to speak.

New Stewart Doctor Appointed Coroner

VICTORIA, Feb. 4.—Dr. J. W. Vosburgh, new physician and surgeon at Stewart, has been appointed a coroner by the provincial government. It is announced.
