The special 12-day cruise along the Northern British Columbia and Alaska Coast, which was made by Alaska Coast, which was made by the steamer Princess Alice toward the end of the 1931 tourist season, will be repeated this summer but will be made, instead, by the large steamer Princess Charlotte, it is announced by Canadian Pacific steamship officials.
