"Mr. Pattullo announced that if he were returned to power in the next election he would immediately take stock of the financial condition of the province to assure a proper balance between income and expenditure, somehing which does not now exist. He would reorganize the civil service without fear or favor. He would facilitate an CHURCH NOTICES investigation of our economic condition by a commission

of competent, public-spirited citizens. "Mr. Pattullo would have an investigation of the relations between the government and municipalities in regard to financial matters, with a view to co-operation instead of conflict between the two representative institutions. Under present conditions the municipalities feel that the government is trying to balance its budget at their expense, that it does not care what happens to them as long as it feathers its own financial nest. Mr. Pattullo's policy would be based upon the incontrovertible fact that the inhabitants of the municipalities pay most of both provincial and municipal taxation, and that therefore the transfer of taxation liabilities from one to the other benefits neither in the long run.

"Land settlement is another important feature of Mr. Pattullo's policy which he has emphasized frequently within the last few years. He realizes that following the present depression there is bound to be an important shift of population, particularly on this continent. There never has been an economic relapse either in Canada or the United States without a big movement of people from districts fraught with disagreeable associations to new regions suitable for home-making. British Columbia has many opportunities for home-seekers, and Mr. Pattullo shows foresight in urging that we should prepare for this inevitable development. Even now, settlers are moving in growing volume into the unsettled regions of Ontario and Quebec, and before long that movement will strike the west in increasing proportions.

"Mr. Pattulio also would have the question of education studied with a view to maintaining its efficiency, and to give to those associated most actively with it a more definite sense of security than they now appear to have.

"At best, however, declarations of policy by leaders of oppositions can not be more than generalizations, since these can only be definitely determined in the light of the conditions which must be met in office. Mr. Pattullo, of course, realizes this. He realizes, too, that he will inherit problems of the most formidable character, but he has both the understanding and courage necessary to the solution of those difficulties in the best interests of the province."
