

Fewer books are laid aside for dren. Owing to lack of funds, we mending than heretofore because have never been able to supply the heavy strain involved in their necessant circulation causes them to wear out to such an extent that they can only be rebound or discarded. Our policy of buying reinforced books has brought good results in their wearing quality and has much decreased the number of volumes waiting for binding at one time. With few exceptions, all children's books are now ordered with reinforced binding; all reprints and duplicate pay books are also reinforced : reprints give excellent service and the reinforced copyright wears about three times as long as the ordinary book.

"Highest points touched in the work of the year are as follows: "The largest number of borrow-

ers in one month came in November with 79 applications. The number of books added reached high hark also in November when 81 additions were made. The largest monthly chculation was that of January with 7312 volumes.

Busiest Day

The largest number of books is sued on one day was on Saturday. November 7 when 684 volumes went out; numbers ranging from 600 to 675 have occurred several times in the 1931 records.

"In connection with the number of additions for the year, it should be noted that this is the first year in which a distinction has been made between volumes new to the library and those replacing worn out books. The 634 noted as new had not before been placed in the col-


