

Just by way of adding further interest to this summary of some of the results of Mr. Bedford's investigation it may be noted that some dinary vitality at low temperatures but they could grow over an extremely wide range of temperatures. Take, for example, the case of one fellow-a "rod bacterium" about 25,000th part of an inch in length. This sub-visible creature, by the way, "doesn't mind very much whether it has air to breathe or not and seems to thrive rather nicely when the air is replaced by either hydrogen or carbon dioxide gas." Normally it lives in the surface water of the North Pacific Ocean, but experiment showed that "this particular bacterium can grow over a range of temperatures from -5 deg. C. to 37 deg. C. (-23 deg. F. to 98.6) deg. F.). . . . It grows most profusely at 20 deg. and 25 deg. C., and then gradually slows down as the range is extended on both sides of these two temperatures."

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the week ending vesterday totalled 424,000 pounds of which American vessels landed 208,500 pounds and Canadian, 215,-500 pounds. This brought the season's landings up to and including vesterday to 2.605.950 pounds including 1.449,900 pounds from American bottoms and 1.166.050 from Canadian. Low prices prevailed throughout the week with a high bid for Canadian fish of 5.1c and 2c and low of 4c and 2c. The top price of the week for American fish was ic and 3c and the low 4c and 2c.


