Legal Dispute Over Red Top Mine at Stewart

The British Columbia Court of former champion has been away Appeal has affirmed a decision of from the ring for over ten years. He the Supreme Court trial judge, Mr. is 49 and weighs 300, about 50 Justice D. A. McDonald, whereby John McNeil and James A. Connors, miners of Stewart and Juneau respectively, must pay \$10,000 damages to Harry Quickstad, miner, for breaking a contract to sell the Red Top mine near Stewart to him. Appeal of McNeil and Connors to the higher court failed, the original judgment being affirmed with Mr. Justice McPhillips dissenting.

The court found that it was not necessary to add as parties to the suit the names of David Johnson and J. J. Wored of Seattle to whom Quickstad had assigned ten and fifteen percent interests respec-

When the defendants broke an option agreement to sell the mine to him for \$250,000, Quickstad claimed that he was negotiating for a sale of the property, which adjoins the George Copper, to J. F. Duthie of Seattle.
