Announcement Came Suddenly and Dramatically Before Small Group of Newspapermen at Washington Today-Abolition of Many Horrors of Modern Warfare Advocated

Proposals Are Too Drastic To Suit Republic of France

That Nation Presents Suggestions Regarding Aviation Curtailment and Would Abolish Aerial and Chemical Warfare Generally—Canadian Views Expressed

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 22:-President Herbert Clark Hoover, in a sudden and dramatic announcement at the White House today, proposed principles for reducing the arms of the entire world by nearly one-third. With Secretary of State Stimson at his side, the President read to a small group of newspapermen a statement saying: "The time has come when we should cut through the brush and adopt arms reductions calculated to save between ten and fifteen billion dollars during the next ten years."

President Hoover proposed:

Abolition of all tanks, chemical warfare and large mobile guns.

Reduction of one-third in the strength of all land armies over and above the "so-called police component."

Abolition of all bombing planes and total prohibition of all bombardment from the air.

Reduction in the treaty number and tonnage of all AIMEE IN battleships by a third, aircraft carriers, cruisers and destroyers by a fourth and submarines by a third with no nation having more than 35,000 tons of submersibles.

Riddell, Canadian delegate, declared that Canada was not convinced that internationalization of civil aviation would provide any greater security than was furnished by the present draft convention. Canada's civil air activities, he stressed, were intimately connected with settlement and development of new country.

The French proposals included absolute prohibition of aerial, chemical, bacterial and incendiary warfare and prohibition of aerial bombardment except over fields of battle, air bases and long range artillery emplacements.
