Football, Softball and Baseball Representatives Discuss Details of 1932 Activities

A meeting of the executives of the Prince Rupert Football Association, C. N. R. Softball League and Prince Rupert Baseball Association was held in the Grotto Cigar Store last night, with Bert Morgan in the chair, to discuss the question of playing nights suitable to the three organizations. The following arrangement was made:

Senior football will be played on Tuesdays and Thursdays while junior football will be played on Wednesday nights each week

Senior baseball will be played on Mondays and Fridays while intermediate baseball will be played on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays until the football season opens, after which the intermediates will play only on Sundays, until such time as school closes for the summer term when intermediate baseball will take over the Wednesday evening instead of junior football. on Tuesdays and Fridays. This arrangement should work out satisfactorily to all concerned, as it means that baseballers and footballers each have only one night conflicting with the softball enthusiasts, instead of two nights as was the case last year.
