# HONOLULU URDER CASE COMES TO UNEXPECTED FINISH

## Truce Agreement Is Signed by Japanese and Chinese Officials

Hostilities Which Began Last January at Shanghai Are Definitely Terminated After Months of Negotiations—Both Sides Made Concessions

SHANGHAI, May 5:-Bringing to a successful culmination peace negotiations which have been in progress here for several weeks, a truce agreement was signed by representatives of China and Japan today, officially ending hostilities which began here last January and which for a time assumed the full proportions of serious warfare. The

Chinese and Japanese negotiators " were assisted in reaching agree-ment by representatives of Great Britain and United States. The reaching of the truce agreement marks the conclusion of the Sino-Japanese crisis. Both sides made certain concessions.


